

Prayer around the Font (Monday) † Loehe Chapel

A service of morning prayer based upon the pattern for worship in Evangelical Lutheran Worship. The service includes preaching as the regular form of reflection on the reading from scripture. It concludes with thanksgiving for baptism as we begin this week in the gift and promise of our life together in Jesus Christ.

OPENING VERSICLES/BAPTISMAL SONG:

The opening versicles, spoken responsively between a worship leader and the assembly, and opening song for Mondays will change with the seasons and with the setting.

THANKSGIVING FOR BAPTISM:

The thanksgiving may follow the order on ELW, p. 307 (minus the concluding prayer) or may use another option (see the Leader Guide). The opening may be sung or spoken.

MORNING HYMN: [REDACTED]

This hymn is a song of praise and thanksgiving to God at the beginning of a new day. It may sing of God's gift of life in the creation & new life in the resurrection of Jesus Christ. It may make reference to the morning and/or to the season of the church year.

PSALM: [REDACTED]

*The Psalm appointed for the day is sung or spoken, done in a variety of ways. It concludes with a time of silence and the **psalm prayer**. The psalm prayer may be found after the psalm in the ELW LDE, beginning on p.737.*

SERMON

If there is not a final-year preacher scheduled for this week, the planning group is encouraged to think creatively about how to respond and reflect upon the lectionary reading for the day. This could also be a time to focus on any commemorations, lesser festivals, or liturgical events that might be taking place this week – but it does not need to be. This could be done through poetry, visual arts, dance, a musical offering, or any other form of reflection upon the text for the day.

HYMN or CANTICLE: [REDACTED]

This hymn may be another morning hymn, or may reflect the scripture reading for the day and continue the proclamation of God's word in song. The canticles associated with morning prayer—the Benedictus (Song of Zechariah) and the Te Deum (We Praise you, O God) on festival days or in festival seasons—may also be used. See ELW p. 303 for several examples of these canticles.

PRAYERS:

The prayer may take a variety of forms, including prayers of thanksgiving and intercession.

CONCLUDING PRAYER & LORD'S PRAYER

The assembly stands. The worship leader offers a concluding prayer and invites the assembly into the Lord's Prayer (Our Father in heaven...)
